### **November Celebrates Veterans**

We all have a veteran to thank this month...the ultimate Thanksgiving. It is always appropriate to honor and respect those who have served our country, and those who have died for their service as well. Did you know that the United States has a living shrine to those who gave their lives so we could enjoy our freedom? This living shrine is the General Grant Tree in Kings Canyon National Park in the Sierra Nevada mountains: a Giant Sequoia and the second largest tree on earth. President Eisenhower proclaimed this in 1956. Every Veterans Day since 2012 there has been a ceremony at the tree at 11:00 a.m.. Few things can compare to hearing Taps being played at the base of this majestic tree. The story of how this began is presented in a 12-minute video on YouTube called Grant Tree Veterans. Go to YouTube or come to our November Grange meeting to view this little-known story.

On Sunday, November 17 at 2:30 at Linn-Benton Community College in the Takena building, there will be a viewing of the film and true story called *Pueblo*, featuring an Albany actor, Geno Romo and written by Emmy Award winning film editor (Seinfeld Show), Bill Lowe. The rains are returning, so the carts get tucked under eaves, irrigation gear is brought in from the fields, and the rodents find new living arrangements. We had a lovely, warm October, and the frost cordially waited to arrive until we got a good crop of sweet peppers in.

A few weeks ago, I was rinsing out a sloppy bucket just after sunset, and as I flung away the last water droplets, I happened to look up to the West. I noticed what looked like a headlight from a parked vehicle beaming steadily through a fog. Strangely, it was high above any surrounding hills, and the night sky was utterly clear, without so much as a mist hovering. I kept staring for a minute or two, baffled by the lack of movement or any change at all. When they got hot and tired, the Poet sat in the shade of an old oak tree.


The Filly and the Foal checked in with their moms, had a drink or two,

### Reports from Marys River Grange #685 January 1979

"Our annual Christmas party was held on Dec. 16, 1978. We started off with a potluck dinner at 6:30. While the dishes were being done, the men put up the tree and some of the ladies fixed the sacks of candy. The tree was decorated, Santa came. We all had a nice time visiting and watching the little ones. We sang Christmas songs. There were about 68 present."

"After much water pipe fixing we had our New Years Day dinner. There were 22 present. Games were played and the Christmas Tree was taken down. A nice day was had."

"Two of the best work days we have had this year were in Dec. – One was Dec. 17. Large group of men got wood and the ladies served lunch. On Dec. 31 a group of men worked 3 or 4 hours on the pipes. A real cold job."
